FRE 325: Francophone Literature and Culture: (Julia Martín)

In French 325 Francophone Literature and Culture, we are focusing on Algeria, Morocco, and Tunisia through the lens of crime fiction to gain a better understanding of the history, politics, and culture of North Africa. In September, French Conversation Hour hosted by Pi Delta Phi went to University Galleries to learn more about the exhibit by Aram Han Sifuentes, whose artwork inspires conversations around the politics of immigration. At the exhibit, we saw protest banners that Aram Han Sifuentes created with the goal in mind of expressing ideas of liberty and equity for everyone. She also presented samplers with citizenship test questions sewn on them and sold for \$725- the price of the test to provide funds to those who need to take the test. French Club participated by creating our own protest banner (which we designed, cut out, and assembled all together in solidarity) now on display in the language commons, which states "my native language is beautiful" in both French and Spanish.

Archaeology Internship (Erin Jessup)

It can often be surprising which situations you may find yourself using your French language skills. This summer, I had an archaeology internship in Mississippi. I worked on many Native American sites, and one of them was at the Grand Village of the Natchez Indians in Natchez, MS. This is a mound site where there were three visible mounds. The Natchez had contact with the French, and in the mid-18th century, fought against them. The French had even taken over the Grand Village at some point to use as their base as they attempted to shoot at another fort that the Natchez had taken over. What was amusing was that there are reports of the French shooting cannonballs at the Natchez, but they were too far away. The cannonballs would roll up to the Natchez fort and they would shoot them back. As far as most people had known, there were only three mounds at the site. However, an archaeologist found a French map with five mounds on it. After some more research and surveying, they found a potential site for the missing mounds, and we found one of the "missing mounds" over the summer! I was able to use my French skills to read the map (and I even noticed some translation and transcription errors). I was not anticipating using my French skills at all in Mississippi, but it was a reminder that language learning is such a versatile skill and you never know when it will come in handy and serve a critical purpose.

Outside of classes, I had a great time exploring Grenoble with my friends and my host family. My friends and I would go to the centre-ville each day after school together for lunch and window shopping or sightseeing. With my host family, they took me on many hikes up the mountains, which was so awesome. Each hike would be around six to seven hours long, and it would be an all-day event. I took a bunch of pictures of the mountains and the views from my hikes! Café de chats (Rachel Mackey)



While studying abroad in Grenoble, one of the many things to do on my bucket list was to visit a Cat cafe / Café de chats! Cat cafes are rare in the United States due to numerous FDA regulations. They are by no means illegal, so long as the coffee shop can provide documentation and numerous veterinarian check-ups for all of the cats, which is extremely expensive. In France however, so long as the cats are initially checked to make sure they are healthy, they don't need to go to a veterinarian every six months. Not only are cat cafes adorable, but they also open a great window to practice your french! According to a barista I talked to, most cats get a check-up every two years. But if there is any sign that the cat is sick and/or pregnant, they are immediately removed from the public. I was super excited to go to one of these cafes, and as it turns out, they are everywhere in Grenoble. I found at least three on my own. Each of the cafes were super clean, and it was apparent that they took very good care of the cats. The cats themselves are typically very social! Due to immense exposure to people, they are very well behaved and they love to play! I always carried a blue bag with me in Grenoble, and they loved to climb inside it. I noticed one day when I was pulling a cat out of my bag that some of the cats have tattoos in their ears. I asked another barista about it in French, and he explained to me that instead of tracking chips, some owners and/or stores tattoo their cats instead with a string of numbers and letters (see picture), which I thought was a really cool concept. Overall, I absolutely adored the cat cafes, and I would recommend that if you visit Grenoble, go check them out!
